In June, 2002, the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center (ACJIC) announced the first installation of an innovative product that revolutionized the way criminal justice information is shared between the state's criminal justice agencies. Known as the **Alabama's Law Enforcement Tactical System (LETS)**, the ACJIC web-based

portal can pull millions of records, titles, registrations and even photographs together to assist the state's law enforcement officers and agencies. State agencies integrating information into LETS include ACJIC, the Alabama Administrative Office of Courts, the Alabama Department of Corrections, the Alabama Board of Pardons and Paroles, and the Alabama Department of Public Safety. Also integrating into LETS is the Secure Homeland Access and Reporting Environment (*SHARE*), an Alabama virtual fusion cell of state and federal homeland security officials, Alabama's law enforcement community, and private sector security personnel who may communicate through secure web portal access, and creates a formal electronic reporting and communication environment to establish effective command and communications between fusion cell agents and field officers.

LETS data sources are transformed into Web services and are searchable by any officer accessing the secure portal. The product currently is being used by approximately 10,000 law enforcement officers in Alabama, and is its third phase.

## About the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center

The **Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center (ACJIC)** is the Alabama state agency responsible for gathering and providing critical information for law enforcement and the criminal justice community. Our information systems process more than 15 million transactions per month, and are accessed by more than 15,000 sworn officers in over 900 criminal justice entities within Alabama and across our nation. ACJIC is connected nationally to the FBI's National Crime Information Center, as well as to all 50 states via the National Law Enforcement Telecommunication System (Nlets). Our 24 hour Command Center monitors the network and all of our systems, and our toll free hotline ensures that officers will always be able to reach our help desk staff. ACJIC also publishes a yearly summary, *Crime in Alabama*, that provides a comprehensive picture of crime in the state and snapshots of criminal activity in specific geographical areas.
